

### **Overview of County Attorney Duties**



Prosecution (PAC)	<ul> <li>State funding is 99% salary for prosecution staff only</li> <li>\$3,000 per year for expenses - no additional funding allocated for rent, computers &amp; IT services, office expenses</li> </ul>
Child Support Contract with CHFS-DIS	<ul> <li>Pays expenses &amp; salaries solely for child support collection.</li> <li>Reimbursement only system, administered by CHFS/DGA.</li> <li>Individual county budgets set annually by CHFS.</li> </ul>
Bad Check Collection Programs (KRS 514.040)	<ul> <li>\$50 gross per check collected</li> <li>Operating expenses only; sharply declining</li> <li>Many offices receive &lt; \$2,000 a year</li> </ul>
Traffic Safety Diversion Programs (KRS 186.574)	<ul> <li>\$25 clerk fee for deputy clerk; \$30 fee paid finance cabinet for TBI fund, DPA, sheriff, etc.</li> <li>Funds office expenses such as IT, computer, etc. that exceed the \$3000 annual stipend; can also help fund personnel, i.e. victim advocate, assistant county attorney, etc.</li> </ul>
Delinquent Tax Collection (KRS 134.504)	<ul> <li>CA receives a portion of penalty paid by taxpayer</li> <li>Used for operation of County Attorney office</li> <li>Declining</li> </ul>
Local Governments	<ul> <li>Not statutorily required</li> <li>Some direct budget appropriations</li> <li>Many are in-kind only (courthouse office space, etc.)</li> </ul>

What are "operating expenses"

#### Follow the Funk V. Milliken Standard

- 1. Necessary;
- 2. Reasonable;
- 3. Beneficial to the Public; and
- 4. Not predominately personal in nature


### Operating Expenses

Actual & necessary incident to the TOTAL duties of the County Attorney Office

Can include both CIVIL & CRIMINAL duties

# Allowable Operating Expenses





## KRS 186.574 – Traffic Safety Statute

Authorizes a county attorney to operate a traffic safety program for traffic offenders



Prohibits Kentucky CDL license holders from participating



Authorizes the county attorney to charge a "reasonable fee"



Restricts the fee to "operating expenses"




Requires an annual report to PAC by October 1




Requires a set fee of \$25 fee for clerks and \$30 fee for other agencies 








# Who can participate?




